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Mission/Purpose Statement

The mission of the Education and Child Development program is to prepare individuals to provide and maintain quality learning and educational environments to children ages birth through high school in home- and center-based licensed early childhood programs as well as public and private educational programs. Additionally, the transfer paths will prepare students in continuing their education in a bachelor's degree program focusing on Birth Through Kindergarten Teacher Education, Early Childhood Administration and Public School Teacher Licensure. Students will gain knowledge of theory-based best practices for engaging and interacting with children and families and will apply this knowledge in approved community-based practicum experiences while being supervised by qualified child care providers, licensed teachers and college faculty.

Program Philosophy

The philosophy of the Education and Child Development program aligns with The Professional Preparation Standards of the students' respective program. This would include standards and practices of the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) (Appendix A and B) as well as the Standards for Ethics of the National Teaching Association (Appendix C), InTASC Model of Professional Teaching Standards (Appendix D) and the North Carolina Standard Course of Study (Appendix E). These standards are grounded in research and focus on providing an inclusive developmentally appropriate curriculum that prepares children for future successes. The importance of relationships, the development of emotional and social competence, the design of intentional play and learning environments, the use of multiple methods of assessment, the implementation of appropriate supports for success, and the use of a variety of instructional strategies are all integral roles in this preparation.

Academic Pathways:

Education and Child Development offers five (5) Associate Degree academic tracks in addition to an Education and Child Development Diploma and five (5) Education and Child Development certificates. Student should be aware that course work includes required observation and

practical experiences in approved licensed child care facilities as well as public and private school settings. The following pages describe the course work required for each of these options.

Letter of Qualification/Tuberculin Skin Test or Screening

In order to complete many assignments successfully, to include mandatory practical hours for EDU 184 and EDU 284, students must provide official documentation of an approved Criminal Background Check, known as a Letter of Qualification. A Letter of Qualification can only be obtained through the Division of Child Development and Early Education (DCDEE), and the official application is available at <https://ncchildcarecbc.nc.gov/> . As part of this process, students will need to complete electronic fingerprinting at a law enforcement agency located on the Dept. Of Health and Human Service's approved agency listing, available at https://ncchildcare.ncdhhs.gov/Portals/0/documents/pdf/A/approved_agency_guide.pdf. Expired letters of qualification will not be acceptable. Requesting a criminal background check at your local courthouse will not suffice for this requirement. Additionally, a Tuberculin (TB) skin test or screening may be required. There are fees associated with application of the Letter of Qualification, the electronic fingerprinting, and the TB skin test or screening. Any fees incurred in this process are the responsibility of the student. Failure to comply with these requests could result in withdrawal from the program. Some programs may require additional screenings, such as a drug screening. More specific information will be provided by your individual course instructor.

Uniform Articulation Transfer Agreements:

There are uniform articulation agreements focusing on seamless transfer for students matriculating from the North Carolina Community College System to the constituent institutions of the University of North Carolina in order to complete a Bachelor's Degree in Birth-Kindergarten teaching licensure program, Bachelor's Degree in a related Early Education non-licensure program, or a Bachelor's degree in K-12 teacher licensure. In order for students to be eligible for transfer, they should be enrolled in a transfer pathway.

Career Opportunities

Career opportunities vary depending on the academic path chosen. Common career paths for graduates in these programs include: teachers of young children in programs such as Head Start or the NC Pre-K program; administrators and directors of child care centers; professional development coordinators, instructors, and trainers; technical assistance specialists with

professional organizations; child care resource and referral agencies, licensed K-12 Teachers; employees of various public and non-profit agencies; regulators with various state and federal programs; family specialists and counselors; and sales representative for early childhood products.

Course Loads

Full-time curricular students must take a minimum of 12 credit hours. Normally students take 15 to 18 hours per semester to graduate in a timely manner. Students registering for more than 20 credit hours must have a cumulative grade point average of 2.0 or above or permission of the department chair. Students who are employed more than 15 hours a week should reduce their class load accordingly. Beginning students who have full-time employment should limit to class loads to 9 to 12 credit hours until they have demonstrated the ability to carry a heavier schedule. Students enrolled in the English and math transition courses through our Career College Readiness (CCR) program in the same semester can enroll up to 6 credit hours for curriculum courses. Students can enroll up to 9 credits hours for curriculum courses if only enrolled in one transition course per semester (either only English or either only math) through our CCR program.

Course Substitutions

Approval to substitute an appropriate course for a course listed on the plan of study may be given. However, the substituted course must academically parallel or enhance the program objectives and students must still obtain the skills and knowledge they need for employment or transfer. Advisors should complete the Course Substitution Form, which will route to appropriate department chair/director and dean for approval. No course substitutions may be made for coursework in the transfer pathways programs. Additional information includes:

- Total credit hours in each category on the plan of study must be satisfied.
- Per North Carolina Community College System policy, classes listed as major hours on the program of study may not be substituted unless the substituted class is listed as part of a core class picklist on the state approved curriculum standard.
- Substitutions are not allowed for classes that are state mandated prerequisites.

- ACA 122 cannot be waived or substituted without the permission of the Chief Academic Officer.
- Student must have earned a grade of “C” or better in substituted course

Attendance

The departmental policy for attendance is that students must attend a minimum of 80% of the course to avoid being withdrawn. Additionally, any student absent five consecutive class hours may be withdrawn. The number of days a student may miss in any given face to face course is dependent on the number of credit hours in the course, as well as the number and length of meeting times. It is at the discretion of individual instructors to apply more stringent attendance policies to include other variables such as “tardies”, leaving class early, and class participation. Generally, a student who maintains consistent attendance in a face to face course is more successful than those having multiple absences. Online courses usually take a different approach in the capturing of student attendance. It may be based on assignment completion within a specific period of time, or other mechanism deemed suitable by the instructor. Specific attendance policies will be included in each course syllabus, and it is the responsibility of the student be informed of the number of absences they have accumulated at any given time.

Observations:

Due to the complex nature of ensuring that students are fully prepared to engage with young children in work environments, all students may be required to complete various course elements within formal and informal school and child care settings. This would include observations, interviews, activity implementation, attendance at meetings and demonstrations. In these instances, the students’ responsibility may include: contacting appropriate personnel, setting up appointment times, providing any required paperwork, keeping all information gathered confidential, requesting parent permission of child participation, and following all policies, procedures, and or request of host agency. In addition to following any dress code required of the agency, students must adhere to the recommended guidelines established by this department:

- Wear your official PCC badge or a name tag for all experiences.
- Be sure your attire is clean and pressed.

- Do not wear strong scents, perfumes, or clothing smelling of smoke or other offensive odors
- Be sure your attire is fitted with enough wearing ease to permit comfortable, unrestricted movement and a professional appearance:
 - ✓ Avoid wearing short shorts, skirts, short or low-necked tops, and tightly fitted clothing.
 - ✓ Avoid wearing sheer fabrics and party attire.
 - ✓ Wear appropriate shoes.
 - ✓ Avoid high-heeled shoes, flip-flops, and backless sandals.
 - ✓ Wear only appropriate jewelry.
 - ✓ Avoid wearing rings, except on fingers and ears.
 - ✓ Avoid large earrings, necklaces, and other jewelry that pose a safety hazard for infants and young children.
 - ✓ Avoid wearing sleeve styles that interfere with safe, comfortable movement.
 - ✓ Wear appropriate undergarments.
 - ✓ Nail length should allow for safe handling of children

Additionally, when conducting any associated course work and/or assignments in the community, please avoid eating, drinking, gum chewing, phone usage and carrying personal items to various child care and educational sites. Smoking is strictly prohibited on school and licensed childcare campuses. When interacting in these situations, all students are to remember they are a representative of Pitt Community College and conduct themselves accordingly.

Confidentiality

Information gathered during participation in observational settings regarding children, parents, staff or volunteers shall be respected and handled confidentially. All information concerning children, parents, staff, teaching staff or volunteers shall not be disclosed to or discussed with anyone other than those authorized to receive such information such as PCC faculty or agency staff, unless disclosure is authorized by law. Failure to abide by this will result in immediate withdrawal from the associated course.

Photography Permission:

Some of your course work may require you to gather photo documentation of events and participants in your observational settings. In this event, you must receive specific permission from the parent or legal guardian of each participant before photographing and using for documentation assignments. Photography permission forms can be obtained from your course instructor. No child may be photographed or included in photo documentation without expressed consent from the parent or legal guardian. Additionally, photographs captured for course assignments may not be used for any other purpose, and must be deleted upon completion of the documentation assignment. It is strictly prohibited for images to be shared with anyone other than program staff or associated course instructors. Violation of this policy will result in immediate withdrawal from the associated course.

Use of Departmental Equipment and Materials:

In some circumstances, students may be permitted to borrow equipment or materials to be used in implementing and completing course assignments. This could include equipment to obtain documentation photographs, materials used to implement activities during practical experiences, and smocks and badge holders to be worn during practical experiences. All items must be officially checked out using the course instructor's documentation procedures, and materials must be returned promptly at agreed upon time in the original condition. Failure to return borrowed materials or equipment may result in ineligibility to register for courses until materials are returned or restitution is made. In the occurrence that PCC property is stolen, an official police report must be submitted to the Education and Child Development Department Chair for review.

Minimum GPA requirement

All students must maintain a cumulative GPA of 2.0 to be entered into the Early Childhood Capstone Practicum course (EDU 284). Students not meeting this minimum requirement will need to complete additional coursework to increase GPA prior to consideration of future enrollment in the Capstone Practicum.

Student Conduct

Each student of Pitt Community College is expected to conduct him or herself in accordance with the college policy to preserve PCC's safe and supportive learning environment. The term "student" includes all persons registered for or enrolled in one or more courses at PCC, either for credit or non-credit. Pitt Community College has the right and responsibility to take necessary and appropriate action to support and protect the health and safety of the college community. Students have a responsibility to review the Student Code of Conduct Policy, and other policies, and to seek clarification, if necessary, from the Office of the Vice President for Student Development Services. The Student Code of Conduct Policy, and other related policies and procedures may be found in the General College Catalog & Student Handbook. This Policy addresses student conduct and creates developmental learning opportunities in an effort to engage students in ethical decision-making. General Members:

A person shall be eligible to become a member of the EDCSO provided such a person is enrolled as a full or part time student in Early Childhood Program. General members are the only members to vote at all meeting of EDCSO and only general members may hold elected office.

Associate Members:

A person shall be eligible to become an associate member of the EDCSO provided such a person either resides in or is employed in North Carolina and:

- Has completed an accredited training program
- Has completed at least one year of continuous on-the-job training in the Early Childhood or Education field
- Is an educator associated with Early Childhood training and/or curriculum program in the state of North Carolina
- Is a former member who desires to retain his/her affiliation

An associate member shall not be entitled to vote at membership meeting of EDCSO and may not hold office. Such a member may, however, serve as voting members of committees.

Patron Member:

Patron Members shall be those persons and organizations who express interest in giving added support to the goals and programs of the EDCSO by paying such annual dues as may be set by the EDCSO. Sustaining members shall not be entitled to vote at membership meetings of the EDCSO and may not hold office. Such members may, however, serve as voting members of committees.

Graduation Requirements:

Upon recommendation of the faculty and the approval of the board of trustees, PCC awards appropriate degrees, diplomas, or certificates to students successfully completing the requirements of their enrolled curricula. All students must:

- Complete course requirements as prescribed in the catalog of record of the candidate for graduation (see Catalog of Record).

- Earn a minimum of 2.0 grade point average (“C” average) in the required courses for the curriculum for which they are applying for graduation.
- Clear all financial obligations to the College.
- Complete at least 25% of credit hours required for the degree, diploma, or certificate at the College; of which 12 semester hours must be major course work with appropriate departmental prefix designation for a degree or diploma (see Transfer Credit).
- Apply for graduation with by the posted deadline

Summer Graduation Stipulations:

All summer graduates will be able to participate in the Fall commencement ceremony. There will not be a summer graduation, and students completing degree programs during the summer will not be able to participate in the previous Spring commencement as was the traditional practice. Please consult with your academic advisor for more information.
